Child Abuse Myths and Truths:

Myth: People lie about child abuse for attention and sympathy

Truth: Research (e.g. police and court statistics) shows that it is very rare for a person of any age to say they were abused if they weren't. However, "false negative reports" of abuse are common e.g. many adults state they weren't abused as children when they were.

Myth: Children usually tell someone about their abuse.

Truth: Most children don't tell anyone. They are often silenced through threats or fear of not being believed. Some children don't have the words to explain what is happening to them.

Did you know?

Key findings from the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Abuse included

Where abuse occurred

- ♦ Average age of survivors when abused— 10year old boys, 9 year old girls
- ♦ 63% of survivors who came forward were males
- ♦ 95% of perpetrators male
- ♦ Average of 24 years to disclose
- ♦ In many cases it is the first time that victims have had a voice
